




Commemoration of the Holy Fathers of the Seventh Ecumenical Council

Statement by the Most Rev. William T. McGrattan, Bishop of Calgary and CCCB President:

To the Catholic Faithful in Canada on the Recent Escalation of Conflict in the Holy Land

Over these last few days, the world has witnessed a rapid escalation of armed conflict in the Holy Land, with reports of a growing number of wounded or dead, including innocent civilians.

As the Holy Land is immersed in this violence and bloodshed, we remember that Jesus, the Son of God, who lived and walked there as Love Incarnate, through His teaching by word and deed, calls us as brothers and sisters to be always united by the bond of charity.

I invite the Catholic faithful in Canada to join other people of good will, here and around the world, in imploring God to move the hearts of those leaders engaged in the present conflict in order to deescalate the acts of terrorism, cease violence and war, and resume constructive efforts that are aimed at establishing lasting peace and concord. As we pray for peace, let us remember all the families and individuals suffering because of this most recent outbreak of violence.

As Christians we are compelled by the teachings and example of Jesus to pray for peace throughout the world. In a fraternal spirit of solidarity with Christian, Jewish, and Muslim brothers and sisters, let us join together in recalling God's desire for peace in the land that Jesus Christ called home.

Commemoration of the Holy Fathers of the Seventh Ecumenical Council

The Council decreed that the veneration of icons was not idolatry (Exodus 20:4-5), because the honour shown to them is not directed to the wood or paint, but passes to the prototype (the person depicted). It also upheld the possibility of depicting Christ, Who became man and took flesh at His Incarnation. The Father, on the other hand, cannot be represented in His eternal nature, because "no man has seen God at any time" (John 1:18).

Below is a quote from St. John of Damascus, one of the Holy Fathers.

"We define that the holy icons, whether in colour, mosaic, or some other material, should be exhibited in the holy churches of God, on the sacred vessels and liturgical vestments, on the walls, furnishings, and in houses and along the roads, namely the icons of our Lord God and Saviour Jesus Christ, that of our Lady the Theotokos, those of the venerable angels and those of all saintly people. Whenever these representations are contemplated, they will cause those who look at them to commemorate and love their prototype. We define also that they should be kissed and that they are an object of veneration and honour (timitiki proskynisis), but not of real worship (latreia), which is reserved for Him Who is the subject of our faith and is proper for the divine nature. The veneration accorded to an icon is in effect transmitted to the prototype; he who venerates the icon, venerated in it the reality for which it stands."

What is First Solemn Communion?

First Solemn Communion (FSC) is an important step in one's spiritual life. It is the first major opportunity for a child to learn about their faith



and fully participate in the Mysteries (Sacraments) of Reconciliation and Eucharist on their own. In one sense this is a spiritual graduation from being a child who passively receives the faith from their parents, to a young person who actively participates in their own spiritual development.

Often children today are presented as infants to the Church to receive the Mysteries of Baptism, Chrismation and Eucharist¹. These children are then repeatedly brought forward at each Divine Liturgy, by their parents, God-parents or grand-parents, to continue nourishing them with the Body and Blood of Christ. This continues till the child becomes old enough to understand the basic truths of the faith and to recognize the meaning of their own actions. At this point, typically in grade 2 or 3, they are taught how to participate in the Mystery of Reconciliation

and then approach Holy Eucharist, no longer being brought forth by others, but on their own.

We use the word "Solemn" to differentiate this step from the first time the child receives Communion that was done at the time of their baptism. FSC is the first time they solemnly approach the Eucharist themselves.

The "First Solemn Communion" program is all about teaching our children how to do this. They learn about who they are and Who God is. They learn how to pray, study and live out their faith, and how to approach worthily our Lord at His Sacred Altar. The FSC program is designed to teach and to encourage each child to take more responsibility for their own spiritual well-being.

¹ It is the Tradition of the Ukrainian Catholic Church to receive all three Mysteries of Initiation at the same time. This Tradition is not only the historical one, but also is the method recommended by the Canadian Bishops, and the entire Synod of Bishops. In the past, due to influences from the Roman Catholic Rite, some priests and parishes only Baptized infants and withheld Chrismation and/or Eucharist to a later date. If you or your child has only received one or two of the Mysteries of Initiation (Baptism, Chrismation and Eucharist), please approach your parish priest to further step into the life of the Church.

What is Our Parish's Plan for FSC this Year?

This Friday I had the honour of meeting with our parish's longstanding FSC Catechist: Marijka Bodnar. Together we agreed to work on the program, and hopefully invite a few new teachers (catechist) to join us. Together as a team we think we will continue the parish's practice of Saturday classes, and will add some content for the children also at the Sunday Divine Liturgy. Also, because Fr. Bo is ambitious and has fun with his Catechetical Puppet Marilyn, we will make some YouTube videos that families can watch at home during the week between classes.

Our plan is to start our programming with an orientation on December the 3rd, after the St.

Nicholas event, then have two classes before Christmas, and many after. If all goes smoothly then we would have the actual FSC date on or around Pentecost (May 19).

So... we are looking for happy good teaching type people who would be interested in having fun with us. If you think that you could give some of your time to this important program, and even more important kids, please let us know. Just send an email or text to Fr. Bo (contact info is on the front page of this bulletin).

Hopefully we can meet together with all our catechists to discuss the program in the next week or two.

What age are kids at FSC? and how do I register my kid?

Typically children are about 7 - 9 years old when they enter into the program. Some children are mature at a younger age, and others are ready at an older one. You need to know how ready your child is. However a good question to ask yourself is: "Can my child

differentiate between good and bad actions?" If the answer is yes, then it is likely the year for them.

Although our teaching team is yet to meet... and is frankly still being put together... you can let us know that you are interested in having your child participate now. Just send Fr. Bo an email letting us know that they are ready for FSC, their name, age and such, and when we are ready to get things going we will get a hold of you.

Single Use Spoons or a Common Spoon?

A Note about the Method of Distributing Eucharist from Bishop David:

The Covid-19 pandemic required our parishes to find alternate ways to distribute the Divine Eucharist in order to ensure the health and well-being of our faithful, namely, using individual "single-use" Holy Communion spoons. For some time now, most Ukrainian Catholic Churches throughout the world have returned to our regular practice in distributing the Divine Eucharist, using a single common spoon for all. It is time for our Eparchy to do the same. However, to allow some time for communities to transition, pastors may implement either of the following practices wherever some of the faithful still wish to receive Holy Communion with individual spoons. 1) In parishes where only one priest

distributes Holy Communion, he begins by distributing Holy Communion with "single-use" spoons to those who desire this, before using the common spoon for others. 2) In parishes where the Eucharist is distributed from several chalices, some ministers use one common spoon while others use individual "single-use" spoons. The manner in which the Divine Eucharist is distributed should not be an obstacle to those desiring to be nourished by the lifegiving Body and Blood of Our Lord. May the Holy Eucharist be our strength and nourishment in our journey towards holiness."

Please note: The threat of Covid / Corona Virus is now lower from the past years. It is no longer considered a pandemic by the W.H.O., given widespread immunity and effective treatments.

How to receive Eucharist in the Ukrainian Catholic Church



All Baptized Catholics are welcome & encouraged to receive Holy Communion provided they have fasted and go to Confession regularly.

All Orthodox are encouraged to follow the Canons of their Church and are welcome to Holy Communion as well in the spirit of Oeconomia.

In places where it is offered, everyone is welcome to receive the "Antidor", the Blessed Bread at the end of Divine Liturgy. However this is not normally done at Holy Cross Parish.

Baptized infants and children, are normally presented in the arms of their parents/God-parents/ grandparents. In the case of babies and very young children, only the Blood of Christ is given.

If you are receiving Holy Communion:

- make the sign of the Cross
- cross your hands over your heart
- tell the priest your name
- come up close to the Holy Cup
- if you are significantly taller than the priest or Eucharistic Minister you can lower yourself so that they can reach your mouth more easily; however this is only necessary if you are taller.
- tilt your head back slightly
- open your mouth wide
- ensure that your tongue is well back in your mouth; do NOT stick out your tongue
- do NOT close your mouth, lick, or otherwise touch the spoon; the distributer will drop the Eucharist into your open mouth
- after receiving, you do not need to say "Amen" as do those receiving in the Roman Catholic Church
- make the sign of the Cross again
- return to your spot, and thank the Lord for this opportunity to receive this Sacrament

Today's Saint of the Day


Venerable Euthymius the New of Thessalonica, and Monk of Mount Athos

Commemorated on October 15 - OCA.org

Saint Euthymius the New of Thessalonica and Mt Athos, in the world was named Nicetas, and he was a native of the city of Ancyra in Galatia. His parents, Epiphanius and Anna, led virtuous Christian lives, and

from childhood their son was meek, pious and obedient. At age seven he was left fatherless and he soon became the sole support of his mother in all matters. Having entered military service, Nicetas married, on the insistence of his mother. After some time he secretly left home in order to enter a monastery. For fifteen years the venerable Euthymius lived the ascetic life on Mount Olympus, where he learned monastic deeds from the Elders.

The monk went to resettle on Mount Athos. On the way he learned that his mother and wife were in



good health. He informed them that he had become a monk, and he sent them a cross, calling on them to follow his example. On Mt Athos he was tonsured into the Great Schema and lived for three years in a cave in total silence, struggling with temptations. Saint Euthymius also lived for a long time as a stylite, not far from Thessalonica, instructing those coming to him for advice and healing the sick.

The monk cleansed his mind and heart to such an extent that he was granted divine visions and

revelations. At the command of the Lord, Saint Euthymius founded two monasteries in 863 on Mount Peristeros, not far from Thessalonica, which he guided for 14 years, with the rank of deacon. In one of these his wife and mother received monastic tonsure. Before his death he settled on Hiera, an island of Mt Athos, where he reposed in 898. His relics were transferred to Thessalonica. Saint Euthymius is called "the New" to distinguish him from Saint Euthymius the Great (January 20).

Epistle: Hebrews 13:7-16 (NRSV)

Brothers and Sisters, remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. Do not be carried away by all kinds of strange teachings; for it is well for the heart to be strengthened by grace, not by regulations about food, which have not benefited those who observe them. We have an altar from which those who officiate in the tent have no right to eat. For the bodies of those

animals whose blood is brought into the sanctuary by the high priest as a sacrifice for sin are burned outside the camp. Therefore Jesus also suffered outside the city gate in order to sanctify the people by his own blood. Let us then go to him outside the camp and bear the abuse he endured. For here we have no lasting city, but we are looking for the city that is to come. Through him, then, let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent. I glorified you on earth by finishing the work that you gave me to do. But now I am coming to you, and I speak these things in the world so that they may have my joy made complete in themselves.
