

Nativity of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ

Nativity Continued

As the story is told by the Apostles, the Roman Empire was powerful. The Romans had conquered much of the then known world. Judea and Samaria, what we know today as Israel, were included in their conquests. Emperor Augustus ordered that a census be taken in all his lands. He needed to know how many people lived in the empire so he could tax them. Everyone had to go to the town of their family's origin to register for the census. This meant that Mary and Joseph had to go to Bethlehem. They were descendants of King David and Bethlehem was the City of David.

Mary and Joseph lived in Nazareth and it was a great distance from Bethlehem. It was about 100 miles over very rugged roads. Moreover, Mary was expecting the baby and it was almost time for her to give birth. Bethlehem was a small town and there were many descendants of David who had come to register for the census. By the time Mary and Joseph arrived in Bethlehem there was no place for them to stay. Joseph tried very hard to find a place to sleep that evening. There was no room at the inn. Finally, Joseph found a cave-like place where they could rest. This place was used by shepherds to protect their sheep in stormy weather. It was here that Mary gave birth to Jesus. The baby was wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in the straw in the manger.

Now, that night the shepherds were out in the fields guarding their sheep. Suddenly, there was a bright light which startled the shepherds. The light was so bright that it turned the night into daylight. Of course, the shepherds were frightened. Nothing such as this had ever happened. Soon an angel appeared and calmed them. The angel said:

"Fear not for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior: which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you: You shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger" (Luke 2:11-12).

Then a larger group of angels appeared. They praised and glorified God and sang, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, and good will toward men" (Luke 2:14). When the angels finished singing, they disappeared and the light began to fade. It became dimmer and dimmer until it was dark again. The shepherds were awed. They didn't know what to do. Finally, they decided to leave their flocks of sheep and go to Bethlehem. They decided that they wanted to see for themselves what the angels had told them. When they got to Bethlehem, they found Mary, Joseph, and the infant Jesus. They fell to their knees and adored Jesus.

Some Wise Men came from the East for they knew of the coming of Jesus. They had seen a star that told them that a new king had been born to the Jews. They followed the star and were looking for the child. At this time the governor of Judea was King Herod. He was a wicked man and was feared and hated by the people. When Herod heard about the Wise Men looking for the child, he invited them to his palace. Herod asked the Wise Men to find the child so that he, too, could worship Him. But Herod was lying. He did not want anyone to take his place. The Wise Men went on to look for Jesus. The Star led them to Jesus and Mary. When the Wise Men found Jesus, they fell to their knees and worshipped Him. They gave Jesus gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The Wise Men left but did not return to Herod. They had a dream that warned them that Herod wanted to harm Jesus. Instead, they returned to their native country by a different route.

The Icon of the Nativity


(This section of the article has been significantly rewritten by Fr. Bo so that it better fits the particular image and explains a little more about the reasons why the icon was written as it is. The original article comes from the same document on goarch.org as the one on the first pages.)

The icon of the Nativity tells the story of Christ's birth from the Scriptures. It also shows that all creation is taking part in Christ's birth. The angels give thanks with their song; the heavens give the star; the Wise Men give their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The poor, humble shepherds give their praise and amazement; the earth gives the cave, and humanity gives the Virgin.

This Holy Icon is an icon with many scenes. First, it stresses the importance of the Theotokos, the Mother of Jesus. She is placed in the centre and is the largest figure in the icon. In this icon, she is lying on a bed and looking away from the Christ child she gave birth to. The reason for her awkward contemplating gaze is that she knows from Sacred Scripture that no-one can look at the face of God and live, and that indeed lying next to her is God Himself.

The three stars, denoting her virginity before, during, and after the Nativity, are on her garments (although

one is not visible as she lies on her side). The Christ Child, in the center of the icon, is in swaddling clothes and is lying in the manger. This manger is depicted as a tomb, and the swaddling clothes as a burial linen foretelling the purpose of Christ's birth; to die for us.

In the background is the dark cave where He was born. In the cave are an ox and a donkey guarding the newborn Babe. Even though the Gospels say nothing of the cave, this information is from Holy Tradition.

Neither do the Gospels speak of the ox and the donkey, but all icons of the Nativity include these animals. Including the animals in the icon fulfills the prophecy of Isaiah 1:3, "The ox knows his master, and the donkey his master's crib: but Israel does not know me, and the people have not regarded me."

A beam of light comes from a "mandorla" which signifies heaven and therefore the presence of God the Father. Note that mandorlas are

painted with their inside darker than the outside as they are so intensely bright that the further we gaze into them the more blinded by the light we become. From the heavens a star appears to all parts of the world. It teaches that this bright star is an astronomical happening, and is a messenger from heaven announcing the birth of Jesus. Then the light from the star points directly to the cave. This beam is split into three rays with the second ray pointing directly at baby Jesus showing that He is the Second Person of the Holy Trinity.

The dark blue interior of the Mandorla, and lighter exterior shows heaven which is beyond our ability to see due to it's brightness blinding us. The star from heaven shining upon the cave revealing to all Christ's birth/

On the left hand side of the icon is another scene. The Wise Men, who were led by the star, are riding horses to bring their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to Jesus. The Wise Men are of various ages. One is without a beard. In those days, young men did not wear beards. The other Wise Man has long hair and a long beard, which indicates that he is much older. These details teach that regardless of age and appearance, the Good News was given to each and everyone.

Opposite the Wise Men is the scene with the humble shepherds. An angel proclaims the glad tidings. Often a young shepherd is shown playing a reed instrument. This scene reveals that the music of the humans was added to the hymn of

the angels.

Across from the shepherd's scene is the heavenly choir of angels. They are giving glory to God. The angels serve two purposes in the Nativity of Christ.

Angels look to the heavens and sing majestic praises about God's glorious love. God so loved mankind that he chose to become one so that He and they would not remain separated.

They give glory to God and announce the good news to all mankind.

The background shows a very rugged terrain. This is not a true representation of the land in this area. Joseph could not find room in Bethlehem, so they went outside of Bethlehem to a cave. This rocky mountain formation only serves as a background for the event.

In the lower part of the icon are two more scenes. In the right hand corner are the two women Joseph brought to take care of the Christ child. They are bathing

Him just as any baby is bathed. The humanity of Jesus is clearly shown in this setting.

Opposite the bathing of Jesus scene sits a sad and worried Joseph. He is not part of the central group the Christ Child and the Theotokos as he is not



Satan trying to convince Joseph to reject both Mother and Child by claiming that the conception was illegitimate.

the natural father. The old man who is actually Satan is depicted in wild furry robes and portrayed in profile. The reason he is depicted in profile is that he is less than fully human. Normally all people are depicted with both eves visible. (the Shepherd looking up at the angel is technically painted wrongly). Here Satan is trying to convince Joseph that virgin birth is impossible. He's telling Joseph that he's a fool if he

believes this. This story comes to us from Holy Tradition. The sad Joseph shows us not only his personal predicament but the dilemma of all mankind the difficulty of accepting that which is "beyond words or reason."

The tree, which is in the middle of the lower part of the icon, is a symbol of the Tree of Jesse. This tree refers to Isaiah 11:1-2, "But a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and from his roots a bud shall blossom. The spirit of the Lord shall rest upon Him." King David is the son of Jesse and Jesus is a direct descendent from the House of David.

The Celebration of the Feast of the Nativity

(this last section of the article is not edited significantly from the original)

As with Pascha, or Easter, the Feast of the Nativity begins with a period of preparation. It is proceeded by a fast corresponding to Lent and lasting for forty days. The fast begins on November 15.

On the Sundays immediately before December 25, special commemorations emphasize the link between the Old Covenant and the New. On December 20 the Forefeast of the Nativity is

commemorated, and the daily liturgical texts are directed toward the Feast itself. On Christmas Eve, services typically include the Great or Royal Hours, Great Vespers, and the Liturgy of Saint Basil.

On Christmas Day the service commemorates the birth of Christ in Bethlehem, the adoration of the Shepherds, and the arrival of the Wise Men with their gifts. The service held on this day is the Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom.

The days following Christmas are associated with the Theotokos and Joseph. December 26 is the Synaxis of the Mother of God, and the first Sunday after the Feast commemorates "Joseph the Betrothed." December 29 commemorates the Massacre of the Innocents, and January 1 the Circumcision of our Lord. The Nativity season concludes on December 31, but the spirit of the festival extends to the celebration of Theophany (Epiphany), the feast commemorating the Baptism of our Lord in the Jordan River.

Christmas Pastoral Letter of His Beatitude Patriarch Sviatoslav

Most Reverend Archbishops and Metropolitans, God-loving Bishops, Very Reverend Clergy, Venerable Monastics, Dearly Beloved Brothers and Sisters, in Ukraine and throughout the world

Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel.

(Is. 7:14)

Christ is born! Glorify Him! Beloved in Christ!

In this time of war, we, the Ukrainian people need a sign, a sign of hope—that God is with us, that God's life-giving power is stronger than the deadly power of the enemy fighting against us. In the Holy Scriptures, the birth of a child is a sign of hope from God! Today throughout the world the Church proclaims: "But as he [Joseph] considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, 'Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit... She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.' All this took place to fulfil what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: 'Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel' (which means, God with us)" (Mt. 1:20, 22-23).

Isaiah prophesied about Christ: "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace" (Is. 9:6). As often happens with God's promises, the fulfillment of the prophecy exceeds all human expectations because the Child that is born is not just an ordinary human child but the Son of God! He is the living God present among us. What is now being sent to humankind is not only a sign and symbol of hope – the Lord Himself comes to ensure and fulfill this hope. He comes as a baby in whom is God's power and might, God's authentic peace for all humanity, and for Ukraine in particular. The eternal God becomes man, one of us, for all time. So indeed, God is with us!

Angels rejoice in heaven, and people exalt today, and all creatures leap with joy because of the birth of the Lord Saviour in Bethlehem; for all deceit of idolatry has ceased, and Christ reigns forever.

We must live with the hope of Christ, overcoming all challenges and trials. Even when it seems to us that the world around us is collapsing, when the enemy's deceitful propaganda suggests to us that we have no future, we still hope against hope because God is with us! The Holy Apostle Paul reminds us: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and



today and forever" (Heb. 13:8). If we have Christ, we have a future that no one can take away from us.

The Almighty God comes into the world even now, this year, in His Nativity, in the body of a defenceless, weak child, to dispel fear before the strong and powerful of this world. God does not force anyone to anything but captivates us with his beauty and light, joy and peace. He appears to us today as a weak and vulnerable baby so that we accept Him, love Him, and tenderly embrace Him—embrace the One who envelops us with His love. How wondrous are God's plans! The Ruler of the world, the Prince of Peace is the Child of God! So, in the Nativity of Christ, we can already see today that our future is not to be feared—it is full of peace, joy, tenderness, grace, and love, as we sing in the carol:

And the bright star cries out to the world: The Messiah brings joy and happiness! To Bethlehem hasten all of you now, To welcome God in a poor cave!

God makes Himself dependent on people. He becomes a child so that we, taking up the mission of Mary, His Mother, and Joseph the Betrothed, protect Him from all dangers, all the Herods of this world.

We feel the same responsibility today regarding the children of the war in Ukraine. This is the most vulnerable segment of our society, and the trauma of war in children is the most complex. There are millions of women and children among Ukrainian refugees and internally displaced persons. Among the various types of humanitarian crises are the education and upbringing of children under the constant threat of rockets and bombs, poorly implemented school programs, stolen years of childhood innocence, and freedom from worry. We will protect our children in every way available to us! At the same time, let us remember that their spiritual wounds are healed in love, both in their family and in the family of God's children—in the Church of Christ. Let our church communities be a safe space for children, free from all forms of violence and contempt for human life, because to accept a child in the name of God is to accept the newborn Christ.

Dreaming of a bright future for our children, we must understand that...

... for our people true victory is not only the liberation of territories and secured borders. Winning the war means creating a safe spiritual space of hope for the Ukrainian family, unafraid to give birth to children in their native land. Let every Ukrainian child be for us a sign of hope from God and of our faith in a blessed future.

On this joyful day of Christ's Nativity, "let us commend ourselves, and one another, and our whole life to Christ our God." May all those imprisoned and held captive know that we have not forgotten them and continue to pray for them. May all the wounded and traumatized experience the joy of our Saviour's birth and God's healing touch. May the relatives and friends of those who have gone missing without trace never doubt the Lord's closeness to them.

With Christ in our hearts, already today let us plan to rebuild all that has been destroyed—both physical

and spiritual, so that our brothers and sisters, scattered around the world, do not lose hope of returning home, but, on the contrary, dream of their active participation in the revival of the country. But above all, let all the children of our nation know how much God loves them, and that with God's love even the greatest evil can be overcome.

From the bottom of my heart, I impart on you all my fatherly blessing, and wish each of you, from the youngest to the oldest, the authentic joy of the children of God, a tasty kutia, a merry celebration of Christ's Nativity, and a happy, peaceful, and blessed New Year!

Christmas Message from Bishop David and all the other Canadian Ukrainian Catholic Bishops

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!" (Luke 2:14)

As we celebrate the Feast of the Nativity of Our Lord, we do so with a sense of wonder in our hearts. The story of the birth of Jesus serves as a constant reminder of God's love for us. To express God's boundless love for us, God appears among us in the person of his own son, Jesus Christ. God with us. Emmanuel. And in this we rejoice!

This year, we celebrate Christmas in the midst of much unrest in the world, in Ukraine, the Middle East and the Holy Land - the very birthplace of Our Saviour - and elsewhere.

Peace. We long for peace.

Another student asked, "Is it when, from a great distance, you can tell a date palm from a fig tree?" "No," said the rabbi. "Then," the students asked, "When is it?" The rabbi answered, "It is when you look into the face of any human creature and see your brother or sister there. Until then, night is still with us.

Ah, to see brother or sister in all! This is the call of all humanity!

Yet, we live in a world that is all too often filled with horrific examples of communities torn apart: hunger and starvation, ethnic cleansing, segregation, genocide, drug wars, tougher immigration, and so on.















What's the difference between, Bishops, Cardinals, Metropolitans, the Pope, Patriarchs and other 'Bishopy' People?

Well, lets start locally and move our way up the hierarchy.

A "parish" is a community of people who worship the Holy Trinity and work together to spread the Good News. A parish is lead by the "pastor" who is an ordained priest appointed to a parish by the local bishop. Sometimes a parish can also have assistant pastors and deacons, as well as other leaders both ordained and not (such as Sub-deacons, Catechists, Cantors, Parish Pastoral Council members, etc...) who help the pastor lead the community.

An "Eparchy" is an organized geographical area which contains several parishes. It is lead by a bishop (aka Eparch). The bishop oversees the local parishes, priests and deacons. In some church circles they call this a "Diocese." We belong to the Eparchy of Edmonton, which covers all of Alberta (and




Similar to an Eparch who leads an Eparchy, there are also Exarchs who lead Exarchies. An Exarchy is a geographical area which is either not organized enough or not big enough to be made into an Eparchy. Exarchs are bishops just like Eparchs. There are no Exarchies in North America, but there are several in other places.

And another type of bishop is an "Auxiliary Bishop". This is a Bishop who does not oversee an Eparchy or Diocese, but rather assists another Bishop. In Canada currently there is only one Auxiliary Bishop who assists in Winnipeg.

A "Metropolia" is a collection of Eparchies. When all the bishops of a Metropolia gather, the "Metropolitan" or "Arch-bishop" chairs their work. In our case as

Ukrainian Catholics within the country of Canada, we are part of the "Metropolia of Canada." Metropolitan Lawrence Huculak of Winnipeg is our leader. Since the "Eparchy" of Winnipeg is the territory of Metropolitan Lawerance, and Metropolitan Lawerence is an Arch-Bishop, that Eparchy is properly called an "Arch-Eparchy".



When all the bishops of an entire "Particular Church" (such as the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church from around the whole world) gather it is called a "Synod". The synod is our Church's highest authority.

The one who presides (leads) the synod is called the "Patriarch" (or "Major-

Archbishop"). Our Ukrainian Catholic Patriarch is the local Bishop of Kiev & Halych, as well as the Metropolitan of the Kievan Metropolia. Patriarch Sviatoslav Shevchuk therefore sets the agenda and oversees the entire Particular Church.



There are 23 Particular Catholic Churches which are all equal in value to each other, yet differ greatly from one another in size. Together they make the whole Catholic Church.

The leader of the whole "Catholic Church" is the local Bishop of Rome, the Archbishop of Vatican City (a Metropolia), and the Patriarch of the Particular Catholic Church known as the Roman Catholic Church. His title is "Pope" which perhaps is best translated as "Papa or Dad." Our current Pope has taken the name **Pope Francis**.



There is one more group that we should perhaps talk about:

Cardinals. Popes select various bishops to be Cardinals. These are often, but not always, taken from among the Archbishops and Patriarchs. A Cardinal is basically an advisor to the pope. In addition to administrating and advising, Cardinals get to nominate and choose (elect) a new Pope if there is need for a new one.

It is important to note that in the eyes of God all people are equal. God loves a simple child as much as He loves the Pope. Everyone has a God given role to fulfill in our communal pilgrimage to the Heavenly Kingdom. Therefore Bishops are not greater than any of the Laity (non ordained), however we recognize their very important role in the Church as our spiritual leaders and shepherds. May God grant them many happy years!

(Bishop-Elect means a soon to be Bishop, and Bishop Emeritus means retired Bishop)

Brothers and Sisters, by faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac. He who had received the promises was ready to offer up his only son, of whom he had been told, "It is through Isaac that descendants shall be named for you." He considered the fact that God is able even to raise someone from the dead—and figuratively speaking, he did receive him back. By faith Isaac invoked blessings for the future on Jacob and Esau. By faith Jacob, when dying, blessed each of the sons of Joseph, "bowing in worship over the top of his staff." By faith Joseph, at the end of his life, made mention of the exodus of the Israelites and gave instructions about his burial. By faith Moses was hidden by his parents for three months after his birth, because they saw that the child was beautiful; and they were not afraid of the king's edict. And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets— who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions,

quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection. Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented— of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground. Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised, since God had provided something better so that they would not, apart from us, be made perfect.

the father of Joseph the husband of Mary, of whom Jesus was born, who is called the Messiah. So all the generations from Abraham to David are fourteen generations; and from David to the deportation to Babylon, fourteen generations; and from the deportation to Babylon to the Messiah, fourteen generations.

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are

to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: "Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.
