John's Ordination to the Sub-Diaconate will take place this Wednesday at 9 am

As we announced last week, Bishop David has chosen to ordain John Lukey to the Diaconate on Saturday, January 27th.

One of the steps that take place before this ordination is the elevation to the minor orders. Since John has already received 3 of the 4 when he became a Eucharistic Minister under (then) Bishop Lawrence, he only needs the

rank of Sub-Deacon now. This last of the minor orders will be bestowed THIS WEDNESDAY immediately before our 9 am Divine Liturgy by Bishop David.

So... as of 9 am this Wednesday if you wish to call John by his proper title, you can call him "Sub-Deacon John". This will change to simply "Deacon John" in January.

Bishop Appointed for Saskatoon Eparchy in Canada

On November 30, 2023, the Vatican announced that His Holiness Pope Francis, having blessed the decision of the Synod of Bishops of the UGCC, appointed the Most Reverend Father Michael Smolinski, formerly the Provincial Superior of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer in Canada, as the ruling bishop of the Saskatoon Eparchy of the UGCC in Canada, as it was reported by the press service of the Holy See.



Since April 28, 2022, the Apostolic Administrator of the vacant seat of the Saskatoon Eparchy has been Bishop Lawrence Huculiak, Archbishop and Metropolitan of Winnipeg. The nominee, Bishop Michael Smolinski, will become the sixth ruling bishop of the Saskatoon Eparchy since its foundation in 1956. The first bishop was Bishop Andriy Roboretsky, and Bishops Vasyl Filevych, Cornelius Pasichny, Michael Vivchar, and Brian Baida led the diocese.

Biographical note

The Nominee Bishop Michael Smolinski was born on September 10, 1972 in Saskatoon, Canada.

He entered the novitiate of the Redemptorists on September 1, 1997, and professed his Perpetual Vows on August 15, 2002. He studied at the University of Saskatchewan, obtaining a Licentiate in Education and a Master of Divinity degree from St. Michael's University in Toronto. He also completed a course in Christian Oriental Studies at the Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky Institute at St. Paul's University in Ottawa.

He was ordained a priest on July 5, 2003, at the Church of the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul in Saskatoon by the then Bishop of the Saskatoon Eparchy, Michael Vivchar. He performed the following church ministries: rector of the house of reception (2005–2015); extraordinary member of the Provincial Council of Redemptorists (since 2008); rector of the parish of the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul in Saskatoon (2015–2019). Since August 1, 2019, he has served as Canada's Provincial Superior of the Redemptorists.

The Saint of the day: Prophet Zephaniah

Commemorated on December 3 - from OCA.org

The Prophet Zephaniah (Sophonias) was a contemporary of the Prophet Jeremiah and the Prophetess Oldama. He was from the tribe of Simeon, and was the ninth of the Twelve Minor Prophets of the Old Testament. The prophet lived at the royal court, where he preached repentance and helped King Josiah eliminate idol-worship.

He prophesied about the calamities that were to come for the people of Judea and the surrounding regions: Gaza, Ascalon, Crete, and against the Moabites, the Ammonites and the Ninevites.

Reflections on the Eucharist by Bishop David Motiuk, Eparchy of Edmonton

The Eucharist and The Family "O Christ, What Shall We Offer You?"

As our monthly reflections on the Eucharist come to a close, let us explore one final theme: The Eucharist and the Family.

As we prepare to celebrate the Nativity of Our Lord, permit me to share with you an early childhood memory of Christmas.

As the youngest in my family, my sole task on Christmas Eve was to keep watch for the first star in the night sky and to announce "God's star shines!" With this my family would gather around the table and sing the ancient carol "Boh predvichnyj" (God Eternal is born to us) and then begin the Sviat Vechir, that is, the traditional Christmas Eve Supper with its twelve lenten dishes specially prepared for the occasion.

At first I suspected that the task assigned to me was a sneaky way of keeping me occupied and out of trouble as a young boy; however, having checked it out with friends my

age, I quickly learned that it indeed was a valid Christmas tradition practiced for generations!

A star. The Star. The Star of David. The Star of Bethlehem.

"In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we have observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage'.... And there ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy.

"On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh." (Mt 2: 1-11).

The Wise Men from Persia clearly recognized the heavenly King born on earth. Led by a star, they

arrived in Bethlehem bearing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And when they found the Christ-child lying in a manger, they adored him, the Eternal God.

The gifts of the Magi are of particular significance.

The gift of gold is a recognition that Jesus is the king of Israel, of the entire universe, and of the Kingdom of God to come.

The gift of frankincense signifies that Jesus is indeed God, since incense is used for worship, and we worship the One True God.

And the gift of myrrh, which was used to anoint bodies for burial purposes, reminds us that Jesus, already at his birth, is the one who has come to die as a perfect sacrifice for the people.

In these gifts, therefore, are contained all the mysteries of Christ. They point to the purpose of his coming to earth: royal king.

divine God, and perfect sacrifice.

What about us? What gifts might we offer our King and our God?


Well, the verses taken from the vespers (evening prayer) for the Eve of the Nativity of Our Lord offer us some insights:

"O Christ, what shall we offer you for your coming on earth in our humanity for our sake? Every creature that has its being from you gives thanks to you: the angels offer hymns of praise, the heavens give a star; the magi present their gifts, and the shepherds their wonder; the earth provides...

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Gold. Frankincense. Myrrh. A virgin mother. Indeed, gifts fit for a King.

And what shall we offer Christ today?

For his part, Christ offers us each and every day his most precious gift, his body and his blood in the Divine Eucharist. For our part, let us draw near to Holy Communion regularly, each and every Sunday. But let us do more.

The greatest gift we can offer our each other this Christmas is an invitation to participate regularly in the Divine Liturgy (Mass) where we are nourished by the Word of God and by Jesus' body and blood.



Let us start by inviting our family members and friends, especial

members and friends, especially those have been away from Church for one reason or another, to come back home. God awaits them with open arms, with love, and wants to give them God's most precious gift, the Eucharist.

When you find the greatest gift, do you not want to share it with others? Are not your children and grandchildren and friends, who are most precious in your eyes and heart, not worth your efforts in blessing them by bringing them to Christ who offers them eternal life?

We are people of the Eucharist.

What are the Minor Orders?

The Church has at least 7 Holy Mysteries (aka Sacraments), two of which are about vocations: Marriage and Holy Orders. Holy Orders are received when a bishop ordains you to the rank of a Deacon, a Priest and a Bishop. However before one receives one of these three Major Holy Orders, one normally takes on the smaller roles within the church: Candle Bearer, Lector, Cantor and Sub Deacon. Although you don't actually need to receive a special blessing from the bishop to do any of the work that is normally associated with each of these ranks, there is an official service to officially make you an official doer of these jobs.

They are a little like stepping stones that one must take before leaping into the Major Orders.

A **Candle Bearer** is pretty much like an Altar Server or a Sacristan. Their job is to assist in the Divine Liturgy by carrying candles, preparing the incense, and joining in the processions.

A **Lector** is the person who sings the Epistle during a Divine Liturgy, and sometimes chants the changeable parts of various services.

A **Cantor** is the person with a special blessing to lead the singing in the Church. They need to know the various sets of 8 tones and confidently respond to the services.

A **Sub-Deacon** is in charge of the Church Building and setting everything up for the clergy so that the services may go smoothly.

There are also many other jobs that normally get a blessing so that people can do them, that are not considered as Minor Orders: These include: Altar Serving, becoming a member of Parish Pastoral Council, Prosphora Baking, Extra-ordinary Eucharistic Minister; Pastoral Minister, Member of the Altar Guild, the person who holds the Gospel Book when it's read, the Cross Bearer, and many more.


