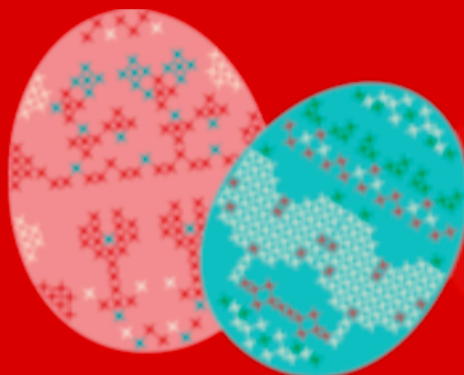

How did the first session of our New Bible Study go?

The study centred on the Holy Pascha Gospel reading from the Gospel of St. John (Chapter 1:1–17).

We had 15 people join us for an engaging discussion.

The Gospel Message

In this sacred passage which we heard at Easter Sunday's Divine Liturgy, the Apostle and Evangelist John proclaims the eternal mystery of Christ: *"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."* From the very first words of the Gospel, the Church is led into the contemplation of the pre-eternal Son, the Divine Logos, begotten of the Father before all ages. These words reveal that Christ is not a created being, but true God from true God, eternal, divine, and of one essence with the Father.

The Gospel further teaches that all things were made through Him, and that in Him is life—the light of all humankind. This uncreated Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it. In the Eastern understanding, this Light is the divine life and grace of God poured out upon the world, revealing Christ as the source of truth, life, illumination, and salvation for all creation.

We also reflected on the testimony of John the Baptist, the Forerunner, who came as a witness to the Light and as the voice crying in the wilderness, preparing the way for the coming of the Lord. Despite this, the Gospel reminds us that the world did not recognize Him, and even His own did not receive Him. Yet, to all who did receive Him, He gave the power to become children of God—not merely by title, but by grace, adoption, and participation in His divine life.

Finally, we considered the profound mystery of the Incarnation: *"And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us."* Here we enter the very heart of Eastern Christian theology: the eternal Logos truly took on our humanity so that humanity might be united to God. As the Fathers teach, God became man so that man might become by grace what God is by nature. In Christ, we behold the fullness of divine grace and truth made visible.

Summary of our Discussion

During this session, we reflected on the identity of Jesus Christ as the Logos, the eternal and living Word of the Father, the One through whom the Father reveals Himself, communicates His divine will, and brings all creation into being.

The study also included a discussion on the mystery of the Holy Trinity—God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit—emphasizing the perfect unity of one divine essence while also honouring the real distinction of the three divine Persons, as confessed in the Nicene Creed and preserved in the worship of the Eastern Church.


In addition, we were introduced to devotional practices from both Eastern and Western Christian traditions. These included the Jesus Prayer and the Rosary, offering insight into the richness of Christian prayer life across traditions. We spent time reflecting on the Eastern theology of *theosis*, the transformative journey of becoming united to God and partaking in the divine nature by grace. We also briefly explored the mystery of divine grace as the uncreated energies of God flowing into the life of the believer, sanctifying, and illuminating the soul.

We discussed the difference between a more legalistic understanding of prayer and devotion sometimes found in the West and the Eastern theological emphasis on prayer as communion, healing, and transformation of the heart through union with God.

We also reflected on selected theological writings from St. John of Damascus, whose teachings continue to deepen the Church's understanding of Christ, the Trinity, holy icons, and the mystery of the Incarnation.

We give thanks to all who attended and contributed to the discussion. The study is designed so that anyone can join at any point and not feel left out, so please do not be afraid to join us.

Help Not Harm

We invite the Catholic community to respectfully contact their local Member of Parliament (MP), requesting their support of a Private Members' Bill (C-218, **The Right to Recover Act – an act to amend the Criminal code – Medical Assistance in Dying**) currently before the Parliament of Canada.

What is Bill C-218? Bill C-218 amends the Criminal Code to make it illegal to provide Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD) to individuals whose sole underlying condition is a mental illness. It recognizes the importance of Canadians to recover from mental illness and ensures help can be offered, not harm.

WHY IT MATTERS:

- **Every life is precious.** As Catholics, we believe in the sanctity of every human life, from the moment of conception to natural death.
- **A desire to die can be a symptom of illness.** Suicidal thoughts are frequently part of mental illness itself, raising serious concerns about whether consent can ever be truly free and informed.
- **Mental illness is often treatable.** Many mental health conditions improve over time with proper care, therapy, medication, and support. Recovery remains possible, even after long periods of suffering.
- **Gaps in mental health care remain unresolved.** Long wait times, limited access to psychiatrists, and uneven mental health services mean some may seek to end their life due to system failure, not medical necessity.
- **There is an increased risk to vulnerable Canadians.** Individuals navigating mental health challenges are more likely to experience poverty, trauma, isolation, disability, or lack of access to care—factors that may pressure individuals toward assisted suicide.

BACKGROUND ON BILL C-218

What is a Private Members' Bill?

A Private Members' Bill is a piece of legislation introduced in Parliament by a Member of Parliament (MP) or Senator who is not a Cabinet Minister, Parliamentary Secretary, or Speaker. These bills allow individual legislators to propose new laws, or amend existing ones, typically focusing on public policy issues. Bill C-218 has been introduced by the Conservative Party of Canada Member of Parliament for Cloverdale-Langley City, British Columbia, Tamara Jansen.

To pass, this legislation will require support from more than one political party.

We believe that many MPs are uncomfortable with the rapid expansion of Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD) in Canada and in particular, the possibility that MAiD will be offered for those whose primary underlying condition is mental illness. We are asking MPs to vote their conscience, regardless of party affiliation.

The difference in passing this Private Members' Bill could be just a few votes in the House of Commons.

It is critical that constituents contact their Member of Parliament asking them to support Bill C-218. If the legislation does not pass, as of March 17, 2027, new laws will take effect to allow MAiD for those whose sole underlying condition is mental illness.

As Catholics and Canadians, we have a responsibility to offer care, hope and protection NOT death for those close to us and those most vulnerable who are suffering.
